Hey Everyone,

Just want to give you an idea of what we've been talking about in youth group. The focus has been and will be the power of one decision. Our material comes from the life of David. I believe we see more of his life than any other person in scripture and it allows for a lot of lessons to be learned.

Practically anyone who knows anything about the Bible knows the story of David and Bathsheba. And as a consequence of David's sin with Bathsheba, their first born child died. But as I read the scripture for youth Sunday, I became totally engrossed in the long lasting implications of David's decision. It doesn't just end with the death of his baby. Total chaos errupts in his family and continues long after his death.

So what was the bad decision? Adultery with Bathsheba? Yes that's bad. Having Uriah, Bathsheba's husband killed? Well yes, that's not good. But look at the first words in 2 Samuel 11:1

The following spring, the time of year when kings go to war,
David sent Joab and the Israelite army to destroy the
Ammonites. In the process they laid siege to the city of Rabbah.
But David stayed behind in Jerusalem.

The bad decision that led to a downward spiral in David's family life was such a simple one. He decided **not** to be where he should have been. (Pause and think about that). That's it. It was that small decision that opened the door to all the other poor decisions he made.

There are many times in life when we need direction. We don't know where to go or what to do. But there are other times when we know exactly what to do. We know exactly where to be. God has spoken very clearly in his word on the matter. And we decide to do what we want. OR We ask God to give us an answer on something that is clearly laid out in his word... we just don't like what his word says:

Should I go to church this morning?

Should I date this unsaved person?

Should I go out to the club with unsaved friends?

These are questions for which the answers are clearly in God's Word. That's why when we ask God, we hear nothing. He's already spoken. We don't like the answer.

Scripture doesn't tell us if David asked "Should I go to war this spring?" If he did, it's quite possible that heaven was silent on the matter. Because he knew it was where he was supposed to be!!!

When you have a chance read 2 Samuel 11 through the end of the book and see how many things can be tied back to David's decision to stay home. And as you're reading make it your prayer that God will give you the power to seek direction when you don't know what to do...and to be obedient in the things you do know to do.



Christian Symbols

Crown

The crown, a symbol of royal authority, represents Jesus, the King of Kings. It can also symbolize the "crown of glory," the eternal reward that faithful Christians receive in heaven (see 1 Peter 5:4). Three crowns are often used to represent the wise men who traveled from the East in search of the baby Jesus.

Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is a symbol of watchfulness and increasing joy as we anticipate Jesus' birth.



The wreath's circular shape symbolizes eternity, or life without end. The candles remind us that Jesus is the Light of the World — he brought light and life to a dark world (see John 1:4-5). On each of the four Sundays of Advent, we light a new candle. As the light grows, so do our hope and joy.

Holly

Holly is a popular decoration at Christmastime, not just for its beauty but also for its religious significance. Holly's thorny leaves and red berries symbolize Jesus' Passion and blood, reminding us of the fate awaiting the Christ child. According to old Christian legends, holly first sprang up under Christ's footsteps, and his cross was made from the wood of holly.

Spiritual Care

Christians who live only for themselves need to re-evaluate their thinking. Christian philosopher Jacques Maritain said it's wrong for Christians to aim for piety and holiness while ignoring people who suffer.

"The care of another — even material, bodily care — is spiritual in essence," he wrote. "Bread for myself is a material question; bread for my neighbor is a spiritual one."

It took years before people fully comprehended God's self-revelation. Even John the Baptist, sitting in


Herod'sprison, sent a message to Jesus asking, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" (Matthew 11:3, NRSV).



The tradition of making resolutions dates back to the Babylonians, who often promised to return borrowed farm equipment. Using a baby to symbolize rebirth and the new year lates back to the ancient Greeks and Egyptians.

Modern-day New Year's customs often focus on prosperity. In Spain, people eat 12 grapes at midnight, hoping to have 1 happy months to come. The Dutch eat donuts because another year has come full circle.



Origins of Watch Night

Many congregations gather on New Year's Eve to welcome the New Year through worship and prayer. Watch Night services provide an opportunity to thank God for past blessings and



to ask for his protection and guidance in the year ahead.

The practice is traced back to Moravian Christians and was later adopted by Methodism founder John Wesley. Watch Night became important for African-Americans on December 31, 1862, as slaves waited for the Emancipation Proclamation to take effect the next day.

A Bible passage tied to Watch Night is Mark 13:32-37. Jesus warns Christians to "keep watch" (or, in some versions, to "keep alert" or "keep awake") for the end of the world.
